Changing Chances CIC was founded in 2019 by Kit Messenger and Alison Rendle to change the conversation about how society can help children and young people be at their best, no matter what life throws in their way.

We focus on shifting the way that young people are supported; helping the adults around them to move away from trying to control or change behaviour from the outside. Instead, we aim to empower young people to understand their own brains and behaviour so that they can avoid risky or unhelpful behaviours and learn the skills which will help them to succeed now and set them on the path towards happy and fulfilled adult lives.

Our mission is to improve the life chances of every child & young person, especially those who struggle at home, in the classroom & beyond.






What we do

Our work is underpinned by a single aim: to improve life chances for all children and young people. However, we know that life doesn't create a level playing field for all. That's why we focus especially on supporting children, young people where there is significant disadvantage due to the intersectionality of trauma, neuro-difference, social disadvantage and poverty.

Level 4: Outcomes & impact

Impact on adult (tier 1 impact)

- Child's skills develop
- Communication & relationship improve
- Motivation improves & wellbeing increases

Child's impact on others/family/school (tier 3 impact)

More helpful behaviours, fewer unhelpful or risky behaviours

Engagement & attendance in education improve

How we measure our training impact

We gather impact data on our work using online forms, school data and interviews with training participants and young people.

We have developed good processes and tools to gather data at levels 1, 2 and 3.

However, as a small organisation, we have found it a challenge to gather sufficient data (both qualitative and quantitative) at level 4, which will demonstrate the impact of our work on young people, on their life chances and on those around them. Not everything that matters can be measured and not everything that is measured matters

We will continue to work on this in the year ahead, as this is the data that really matters – it shows the difference that our work makes to young people and to their outcomes.



Children's services professionals

We work with all of those adults who swirl around the life of every young person: parents, carers, family, sports coaches, neighbours, teachers and other professionals. The more a young person is struggling, the more professionals they will come across in the course of every week.

These adults have power. Everything they say, everything they do, every gesture they make and every punishment they dole out will shape the clay of a developing young person; over time this clay will solidify, bearing the imprint of all of these interactions. Adults can mould that soft clay into ways that are really positive or terribly damaging.





Teenaid programme for Sussex Police

We have been delivering our Teenaid programme commissioned by Sussex Police since 2019. The programme received a very positive evaluation by IPSOS MORI against a robust theory of change. The programme continually develops, informed by feedback from participants.

"The programme acted as a catalyst for parents/carers to change their approach to managing their child's behaviour through understanding the drivers behind their behaviour, leading to a calmer approach and set of strategies to support their child." IPSOS Mori 2020

Our work with schools

We work with primary and secondary schools, with nurseries, special schools and alternative provision. Ofsted has noted a culture change in schools where we've worked:

All schools where we have worked intensively have reduced exclusions and many have either eliminated or are aiming for zero exclusions.

Spreading our message


Our core mission is to change the way that children and young people are supported by the adults, organisations and systems that surround them.

What's coming up in 2024?

In 2024 we will be spreading our message further afield, and we already have some exciting projects planned in Hampshire, the Isle of Wight, Northamptonshire and Kent.

We have been working hard to develop two new services, which we will launch soon: the Young Brain Coach programme and an online platform to enable access to our programmes for self-study and to revisit learning.

Our Parents as Coaches programme will become accessible to more families, as we launch our rolling programme of online courses.

And we will focus on gathering and analysing level 4 impact data: the data that shows the impact that our work has on young people and those around them. We need to allow time to pass before collecting this data because change doesn't happen overnight. It takes repeated practice and support for habits to change and neural pathways to rewire.
